1902

SLII organizes baseball team

The following is an account of a baseball team being organized on the SLII campus as told by the March 1, 1902 edition of the Lafayette Gazette: Now that the football season is over, the boys at the Industrial Institute are about to organize a baseball team: in fact, the necessary equipment in the shape of masks, stomach protectors, bats and balls, have already been ordered, and it will not be long ere the people of Lafayette and vicinity will have the pleasure of witnessing a match game between these boys and a team from some neighboring town. It is needless to say that everyone wishes them success in this new field sport the same success that has characterized their every effort in the past to establish the supremacy of the Industrial teams, and hold on high the colors which have not yet known defeat.

1903

Louisiana's fields first team

In 1903, Southwestern Louisiana Industrial Institute (SLII) fielded its school-sponsored baseball team. However, local competition was scarce, but their is evidence that SLII played against neighboring towns. But, game day information is unavailable.

One of the founding members of the baseball team, Pothier Jean Voorhies, who was better known as P.J., was also a two-sport athlete. Voorhies, who is seated on the far right in the second row, also founded the Alumni Association at UL. A century later, his great grandson, Pothier J. Voorhies, IV (also known as Sport Voorhies) was a member of Louisiana's 2003 baseball team.

The following is an account of the baseball team as told by the February 21, 1903 edition of The Advertiser: The inclement weather has interfered with the work of the baseball during the past two or three weeks; but now that several challenges have been received practice will probably proceed in spite of the weather.

Although there have been mentions of SLII playing games against local competition, local articles recounting the games are not very informative as is shown in the following recap of the baseball team as told by the April 4, 1903 edition of The Avatar: The game of baseball Wednesday evening was very interesting: good plays were made on both sides, which proves that we have excellent material for a good team.

While little is known about the early baseball teams at SLII, it has been found the 1903 team did play intramurals. The following is a recap of one such game as told by the April 11, 1903 edition of The Attakapian: The base-ball game, which was

feared, to be an April fool, did not take place until the second and was indeed the played on this campus as yet. The Reds and the Blues played and at the end of the seventh inning, the score stood 6-6, but at the end of the ninth, the score stood 15-11 in favor of the Reds. Saturday evening the Blues expected to reinstate themselves in the good graces of their supporters, but we are sorry to announce that they were badly beaten by the Reds again that afternoon. The score stood 15-26, and yet the Reds did not play their last inning.

1909

Seven games highlight SLII schedule

Seven games were scheduled for the 1909 SLII schedule; however, results are mostly unavailable. Only three results have been found - all victories for SLII.

The following is an account of the baseball team as told by the April 5, 1909 edition of The Vermilion: An exciting game of base ball was played between our team and the Broussard boys here last Saturday on the Institute campus. Only three innings were played, darkness prevented any further playing. At the end of the game, the score stood 6 to nothing in favor of S.L.I.I.

1915

Cajuns Play Cincinnati Reds

1915: The National League's Cincinnati Reds came through Lafayette to play an exhibition game against the boys from SLII. Although an undated account was found, no box score remains. The Reds won 13-1.

"A large crowd was present on the Institute campus to see the game of ball between the Cincinnati Reds and the Institute team. Many people from a distance and from the parish came in to take in the game. The day was pretty cold but not enough to interfere with the game. The score resulted 13 to 1. Considering the odds the boys were up against, this was fine.

The Reds, of course, are ball players. The way they handled the ball, (and) quick...evidence of competence showed they were right up to the job. The Institute boys were weak on batting and especially so in the last half of the game, when left-handed Fittery began shooting in his swift curves. The boys' strong point was their good capable playing and Walter Billeaud, short stop, made a feature catch that brought him a round of applause. Altogether, the game was very interesting and was strong enough on the part of the boys to really make the Reds show something of their metal (sic) and give an idea of what it takes to make a national player."

1916

Cajuns Play Reds, Again

March 24, 1916: A year later, the Cincinnati Reds again travelled to Lafayette to take on the boys of SLII on Friday, March 24. According to a promo poster, "the game called at 1:30 p.m. promptly on institute campus...teams begin practice at 12:30." The poster also declared that "such stars as Toney Herzog, Wingo, Groh, Mollwitz and Clark WILL POSITIVELY PARTICIPATE." Cincinnati won 9-4.

1923

First 10-win Season

1923: With only 14 games on the 1923 slate, SLI went 10-3-1, the program's first known 10-win season.

1927

Great Flood Shortens Season

1927: The Great Flood of 1927 in the spring cut SLI's baseball season short. Louisiana went 1-6 that season. However, no one knew that it would be the last baseball season at SLI until 1939 as the school discontinued a school-sponsored team.

1939

Baseball Returns

1939: Baseball returned to the SLI campus. The 1939 team featured such names as football All-American Glynn Abel and future coach Raymond Didier.

1946

Dark Debuts with the Boston Braves

July 14, 1946: Former multi-sport star Alvin Dark becomes the first former UL athlete to make his Major League Baseball debut, appearing in the infield for the Boston Braves. He had only 13 at bats with the Braves and was later sent down to the minor leagues, where he was named Minor League Rookie of the Year.

1948

Dark Named MLB Rookie of the Year

1948: After spending one season in the minor leagues, Alvin Dark returned to the majors for his first full season with the Boston Braves. Dark batted .322 with four home runs and 48 RBI on 175 hits (39 doubles and six triples), earning Major League Baseball Rookie of the Year honors. Dark and Jackie Robinson are the only players in MLB history to be named Rookie of the Year for the entire league. That same year, Dark also becomes the first former SLI star to play in the World Series.

Cajuns Claim First Gulf States Title

1949: Although their record is unknown, it is known that the SLI Bulldogs won the Gulf States Conference title in its second season in the league. It would be the first of five consecutive GSC titles.

1951

Dark Named to NL All-Star Team

1951: During the New York Giants' World Series run in 1951, Dark was named to his first NL All-Star team. He later played in the 1952 and 1954 games.

1955

Albritton Named GSC's Top Pitcher

1955: Despite a 15-12 season, **Charlie Albritton** was named the GSC Pitcher of the Year in 1955.

1958

Martin Strikes Out School-Record 18

April 26, 1958: Houma native **Jerry Martin** struck out a school-record 18 batters to lead the Ragin' Cajuns to victory over McNeese State. The strikeout total still stands today as the school record.

1963

School-Record Five Players Earn All-GSC

1963: A then-school record five players were named to the All-Gulf States Conference team, including three to the first team.

1964

Kleinpeter Garner All-America Honors

1964: Outfielder Lionel Kleinpeter became the first player in program history to earn All-America honors. Kleinpeter was a second team NAIA selection.

1964

Dark Graces Cover of Sports Illustrated

July 6, 1964: Former Ragin' Cajun and then-San Francisco Giants manager Alvin Dark was featured on the front cover of *Sports Illustrated*.

1969

Guidry Posts Best GSC Season

1969: Freshman pitcher **Ron Guidry** led then-USL to a fourth-place finish in the Gulf States Conference, while the southpaw went 5-1 on the mound. Guidry earned second team All-Gulf States honors. Guidry finished his freshman campaign with a 1.57 ERA, allowing just 10 earned runs on 36 hits in 56.1 innings while striking out 50 batters. His 1969 season has been noted as one of the best performances by a pitcher in GSC history.

1970

Cajuns Set GSC Record

1970: Gulf States Conference Coach of the Year **Bob Banna** led Louisiana to the school's best record since 1952. The Cajuns set a Gulf States Conference record with 12 straight wins.

1970

Swindler Drafted in 34th Round

1970: Outfielder **Major Swindler** made history as the first Cajun to be drafted by a MLB organization. The Washington Senators drafted him in the 34th round.

1971

Cajuns, Cowboys Battle for 23 Innings

March 27, 1971: Louisiana and McNeese State battled for an NCAA-record 23 innings as the Cajuns came away with a 6-5 win.

1972

Southland Conference Champions

1972: In the program's first year competing at the NCAA Division I level, Louisiana claims the Southland Conference title, winning a school-record 33 games.

1973

Southland Champions, Again

1973: After a school-record 33 wins in 1972, the Cajuns repeated as SLC champions despite a 14-19 overall mark. It will be the last regular season title for the Cajuns until 1989.

1975

Guidry Makes MLB Debut

July 27, 1975: Left-handed pitcher **Ron Guidry** makes his Major League Debut with the New York Yankees, becoming just the second former Cajun to play in the majors. Guidry finished his first season 0-1 with a 3.45 ERA.

1978

Moore Field Opens

March 4, 1978: After nearly 70 seasons of playing on campus, Louisiana moved off-campus to its brand new home - Moore Field. New Orleans spoiled Moore Field's debut with a 7-1 victory. Four days later, the Cajuns would notch their first victory in the new facility - an 8-7 decision over Southern on March 8.

1978

Guidry Wins AL Cy Young Award

1978: **Ron Guidry** posts arguably one of the best seasons by a left-handed pitcher in MLB history when he goes 25-3 with 1.74 ERA, leading the Yankees to their second straight World Series title.

1978

Alvarez Tosses No-Hitter

April 30, 1978: **Jose Alvarez** tosses the first complete game no-hitter in school history, striking out 10 batters in an 11-0 win over Texas-Arlington.

1979

Moore Field Dedicated

March 31, 1979: University of Louisiana president **Dr. Ray Authement** officially dedicates Moore Field in honor of the Moore family.

1982

Credeur No-Hits Southern Miss

March 18, 1982: **Todd Credeur** tosses the second no-hitter in school history, striking out seven batters in seven innings during a 5-0 win over Southern Miss.

1983

Hurst Tosses No-No vs. UNO

May 4, 1983: For the second straight season, a Ragin' Cajuns pitcher tosses a no-hitter as **Scott Hurst** blanks the New Orleans Privateers 10-0.

1984

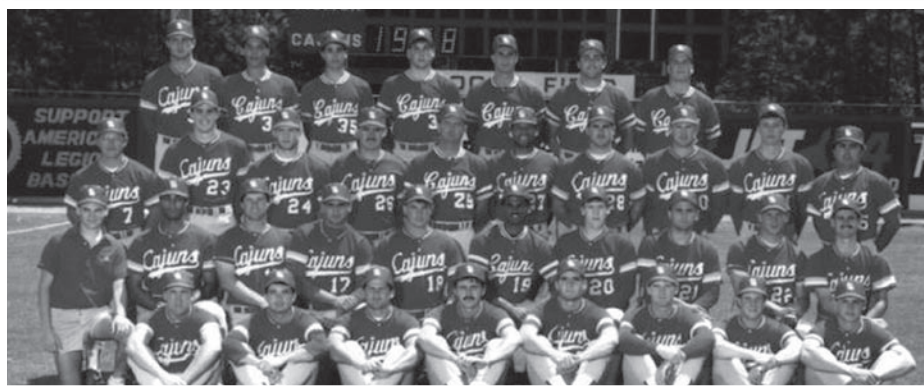
Robichaux, Hernandez Toss One-Hitter

February 22, 1984: Current head coach **Tony Robichaux** and former major league pitcher **Xavier Hernandez** teamed up for a one-hit shutout at Northwestern State. Robichaux got the win, pitching 6 1/3 innings, allowing one hit. Hernandez got the save, finishing the last two-thirds of the final inning for a 1-0 victory in game two of a doubleheader.

1988: Louisiana advances to the program's first NCAA Regional

1988

Changing of the Guard

1988: Mike Boulanger took over a struggling Cajuns program that had spent the previous five seasons as a Division I independent. In his first season, Boulanger led the Cajuns to a 41-23 overall mark, the American South Conference Tournament championship and the school's first-ever NCAA Regional appearance.

1988

Bourgeois Throws Cajuns' Last No-Hitter

February 14, 1988: On Valentine's Day, **Jerry Bourgeois** throws the Cajuns' last no-hitter, striking out six batters in a 10-1 win vs. Southern.

1988

Conference Tournament Champions

May 14, 1988: With an 8-0 win over Louisiana Tech, Louisiana won the American South Conference Tournament championship in Edinburg, Texas - the program's first conference tournament title.

1989

Cajuns win school-record 49 games

1989: One season after making its first-ever NCAA Regional appearance, the Cajuns won a school-record 49 games en route to their second NCAA Regional.

1990

Berry, Bates Make History

February 10, 1990: In a 10-0 win over TCU, **Perry Berry** and **Tommy Bates** each make school history. Berry became the first player to hit three home runs in a single game, while Bates recorded the school's first (and only) cycle.

1991

Cajuns fall one game short of CWS

1991: Louisiana made its fourth straight postseason appearance under **Mike Boulanger** participating in the NCAA South II Regional in Baton Rouge. After a disappointing 16-4 loss in the opener, the Cajuns won three straight games and faced host LSU in the championship game. But, the Cajuns fell one game shy of their first-ever College World Series appearance as LSU defeated UL 8-5.

1995

Tony Robichaux Debuts at Head Coach

February 10, 1995: Tony Robichaux made his debut when his squad visited the Texas Longhorns. However, Texas spoiled Robichaux's debut in a 13-2 loss.

1995

Moore Field Renamed "The Tiguer"

March 3, 1995: Just moments before the start of Tony Robichaux's home head coaching debut, Moore Field was officially renamed M.L. "Tiguer" Moore, Jr. Field in honor of the late M. Lartigue Moore, Jr.

1996

Webb's 23-game Hitting Streak

May 15, 1996: In his only season in Lafayette, **Chris Webb** sets the new school record with his 23rd consecutive game with a hit.

1997

Cajuns Win First Sun Belt Title

1997: In just his third season at the helm, **Tony Robichaux** guides the Cajuns to their first-ever Sun Belt Conference regular season crown en route to a 43-18 overall record. The Ragin' Cajuns later lost in the SBC tournament championship game in Lafayette before earning a bid to the NCAA Mideast Regional.

1998

Sun Belt Tournament Champions

May 16, 1998: After falling 9-2 in the conference tournament title game, the Ragin' Cajuns won their first Sun Belt Conference tournament championship, defeating New Orleans 10-7 in Mobile, Ala.

1999

Cajuns Clinch First Regional Crown

May 30, 1999: After winning their first two games of the NCAA Houston Regional, the Ragin' Cajuns punched their ticket to the NCAA Super Regionals, defeating the Houston Cougars 19-8. The win marked Louisiana's first NCAA Regional title and first Super Regional appearance in school history.

2000

World Series Bound

June 4, 2000: Louisiana used a dramatic late-inning rally to upset top-seeded South Carolina 3-2 and advance to its first NCAA College World Series.

2000

Cajuns Post First Win at CWS

June 11, 2000: The Cajuns scored five runs with two outs in a 6-3 win over San Jose State, eliminating the Spartans and earning Louisiana's first win at the College World Series.

2000

Cajuns Post Third Place CWS Finish

June 15, 2000: In a rematch of the first game at the CWS, Stanford frustrated Louisiana's pitching staff all day long as the Cardinal eliminated the Ragin' Cajuns, 19-9. With a 2-2 finish in Omaha, the Ragin' Cajuns became the first program in College World Series history to win two games in their inaugural trip.

2002

Louisiana Advances to 10th Regional

May 31, 2002: Louisiana made its 10th NCAA Regional appearance in the past 15 seasons as a No. 3 seed in the Baton Rouge Regional. The Cajuns defeated Tulane and LSU before falling to LSU twice in the championship round.

2003

Robichaux Becomes UL's Wins Leader

March 17, 2003: **Tony Robichaux** became the school's all-time winningest coach when he earned his 292nd victory with a 7-1 win over Illinois-Chicago.

2004

Ardoin, Hawke Earn National Honors

March 4, 2004: **Kevin Ardoin** was named the College Baseball Insider National Player of the Week award after pitching a complete-game, one-hit gem against Stony Brook. Ardoin didn't walk any batters, while striking out 12 batters. He struck out the last 27 batters he faced in the 5-0 win.

March 22, 2004: **Phillip Hawke** was named Collegiate Baseball's Louisville Slugger National Player of the Week after hitting .545 with four home runs against the Michigan Wolverines and Harvard Crimson. Hawke finished the weekend with 15 RBI and a 1.727 slugging percentage.

2005

Robichaux Wins No. 600

February 18, 2005: Head coach **Tony Robichaux** notches career victory No. 600 with an 11-7 win over Southern at M.L. "Tiguer" Moore Field.

2005

Cajuns Clinch SBC Regular Season Title

May 21, 2005: For the first time since 1997, Louisiana captured the Sun Belt Conference regular season title as the then-19th-ranked Ragin' Cajuns secured the championship with an 11-1 victory in game two of a doubleheader at Western Kentucky.

2005

A la 2000, Coker Steals Home

June 4, 2005: With the bases loaded and the Cajuns leading Southern 3-0 in the second inning, Louisiana relived a bit of postseason magic. **John Coker** stole home - the first steal of home since the 2000 College World Series and was met by his fellow teammates storming out of the dugout. **Jonathan Lucroy** and **Dallas Morris** were part of the triple steal. Lucroy's stolen bag was the first of his brilliant career.

2005

Faught Drafted For Third Straight Year

June 8, 2005: Senior southpaw pitcher **Austin Faught** became the first player in school history to be selected in the MLB Draft for three straight years. He was drafted by the Texas Rangers all three times.

2007

Robichaux Wins No. 700

March 24, 2007: Head coach **Tony Robichaux** notches career victory No. 700 with a 5-2 win over Florida Atlantic at M.L. "Tigue" Moore Field.

2007

UL Wins Second SBC Title in Three Years

May 12, 2007: Needing to win one game to clinch the 2007 Sun Belt Conference championship, the Cajuns collected a season-high 24 hits en route to a 28-3 win over UALR at "The Tigue". The win marked the second SBC title in the three seasons.

2008

Hunter the Great

April 5, 2008: **Hunter Moody** held Middle Tennessee to two runs over eight innings and was victorious for the 27th time in his storied career. With the win he passed Andy Gros and Scott Dohmann for the all-time lead in career victories. He went on to add four more victories and finished his career with a 31-7 mark.

2008

Louisiana's Mr. 500

April 16, 2008: Head coach **Tony Robichaux** became the first coach in program history to win 500 games at the helm of the Ragin' Cajuns baseball program. Robichaux's 500th victory with the Cajuns came after a 4-3 win over the Northwestern State Demons on "Turn Back the Clock Night". Nolan Gisclair's bloop RBI single to shallow right-center field in the eighth inning plated Brian Bowman for the 4-3 go-ahead score.

2009

Hammerin' Hawkins

May 9, 2009: **Scott Hawkins** hit his 40th career home run against Western Kentucky at "The Tigue", becoming the Cajuns' all-time leader and first player to hit 40 home runs.

2009

Double Play Records Fall

May 16, 2009: The Ragin' Cajuns defense delivered a school, single-game record of six double plays including one to end each of the first five innings and stymied all offensive efforts of the UNO offense.

May 22, 2009: The Ragin' Cajuns defense broke the school's single season record for double plays with their 64th of the season in just 56 games. The 2009 team finished with 66 double plays.

2009

Robichaux Wins No. 800

May 16, 2009: With the third win of the UNO series, head coach **Tony Robichaux** won his 800th career game, becoming just the 30th active coach in NCAA Division I baseball with 800 or more victories.

2010

Remarkable Second Half

2010: Louisiana turned in one of the most remarkable second half runs in recent memory, finishing the regular season with a 23-4 mark. The Cajuns went 17-1 in Sun Belt play, vaulting the squad from ninth place (4-8 mark on April 4) to first place (21-9 mark on May 22). As a result, UL claimed its fourth SBC title under Tony Robichaux (1997, 2005, 2007, 2010).

2010

1,000th at "The Tigue"

March 26, 2010: Louisiana scored runs in each of the first six innings to build a comfortable lead and cruised to a 9-3 win over Florida Atlantic in the 1,000th game at M.L. "Tigue" Moore Field.

2010

Osborne Delivers Postseason Gem

June 4, 2010: **Zach Osborne** tossed only the second complete game shutout by a Cajuns pitcher in NCAA Championships play when he fired one against No. 25 Rice in the Austin Regional opener. Osborne scattered five hits, struck out four and held the Owls to a 1-for-10 showing with runners on base. Chad Keefer's two-out RBI single in the eighth inning gave UL a 1-0 victory.

Setting the Stage

If Cajuns fans were thrilled with the team's performance in 1999, they were jubilant in 2000 when Louisiana advanced to the NCAA College World Series for the first time in both school and Sun Belt Conference history. While in Omaha, the Cajuns proved they were truly among the nation's best, tying for third with their 2-2 record.

In 1999, the Cajuns (42-24, 24-9) were just one win away from advancing to the College World Series, but Rice came back to take the Super Regional championship.

In 2000, however, the cards were just right as the Cajuns (49-20, 20-10) advanced to the school's first-ever CWS. In a reversal of fortunes, the Cajuns saw themselves in a 1-0 hole in the Super Regional at Columbia, S.C. Just as Rice did (to the Cajuns) the previous year, the Cajuns did to the South Carolina Gamecocks.

The Cajuns' amazing comeback was capped off by KPEL announcer and Voice of the Ragin' Cajuns Jay Walker after UL's 3-2 win over No. 1 South Carolina:

"All year long, they clicked their heels and said there's no place like home. Now, the Ragin' Cajuns will end the 2000 season in baseball version of Oz. Louisiana...is in the College World Series."

The Cajuns "Cinderella Season" continued. UL became the first school in NCAA history to win two games in its inaugural visit to Omaha.

The Cajuns in Omaha

Louisiana added its name to one of the most memorable games in school and CWS history with a thrilling 5-4 come-from-behind victory in the bottom of the ninth against Clemson.

In a series of events that will be simply known as "The Play" to Cajuns fans, outfielder Steven Feehan laid a perfect bunt down to score the tying run and shortstop Rick Haydel took advantage of a Clemson error to race all the way from second base and make a perfect slide for the game-winning run.

But, before that, Louisiana enjoyed another record-setting season.

For the fourth straight season, the Cajuns claimed an NCAA Regional berth and established itself as

one of only seven teams to advance to consecutive NCAA Super Regional appearances.

The Cajuns then met No. 1-ranked South Carolina, and things looked grim after the first game of the series as the Gamecocks took a 6-3 win. However, freshman pitcher Andy Gros enjoyed a career night in game two, tossing a complete-game victory with 10 strikeouts.

That set the stage for a deciding game with the winner advancing to Omaha. The Cajuns took an early lead, but South Carolina struck for two runs in the seventh inning to earn a 2-1 advantage. Haydel started his postseason magic in the bottom of the inning with a two-out, two-run double, and reliever Gordon O'Brien made it hold up over the final two innings.

Rewriting the School Record Book

When the smoke had settled, Nathan Nelson and Ryan Gill set new single-season records in hits with Nelson becoming the first Cajun to reach triple digits. Feehan ended his career with his name dotted all over the Cajun record book, including No. 1 positions in games, hits and runs.

Scott Dohmann topped Phil Devey to become the winningest pitcher in school history with 26 victories and was named to the Collegiate Baseball All-America Third Team. Fellow hurler Justin Gabriel was also named a Third-Team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association. For the third time in the last four seasons Robichaux was honored as Louisiana Coach of the Year.

World Series Recaps

Friday, June 9, 2000 Game 1 (Stanford 6, Louisiana 4)

Rick Haydel hit a two-run home run and **Jarvis Larry** and **Nathan Nelson** each hit solo shots, but it was not enough as the Cajuns fell 6-4 to Stanford in their first-ever trip to Omaha.

Louisiana starter **Justin Gabriel** walked three of the first four batters he faced and never seemed to recover, finishing the game with a season-high seven walks.

Sunday, June 11, 2000 Game 2 (Louisiana 6, San Jose State 3)

The Ragin' Cajuns lived to see another day, scoring five runs on five hits with two outs in a 6-3 victory over San Jose State. The loss eliminated the Spartans, who also made their first trip to the College World Series.

Danny Massiatte had a solo homerun for the Cajuns. **Scott Dohmann** shut down SJSU. He got his third win of the postseason, going six and a third innings.

Wednesday, June 14, 2000 Game 3 (Louisiana 5, Clemson 4)

Rick Haydel slid under the tag of Clemson catcher Brian Ellis to score the winning run and advance in the College World Series 5-4.

Will Hawkins and **Tommy Clark** hit back-to-back homeruns in the fourth inning and **Steven Feehan** stole home in the fifth to give the Cajuns a 3-0 lead. The Tigers overcame the six-plus shutout innings with a four run seventh.

Thursday, June 15, 2000 Game 4 (Stanford 19, Louisiana 9)

Edmund Muth hit three home runs and Andy Topham hit a grand slam to eliminate the Cajuns from the College World Series, 19-9.

Stanford and Louisiana combined for eight home runs. The Cajuns committed four errors, which produced eight unearned Cardinal runs. **Steven Feehan**, **Will Hawkins**, **Scott Atwood** and **Nathan Nelson** all homered for UL.

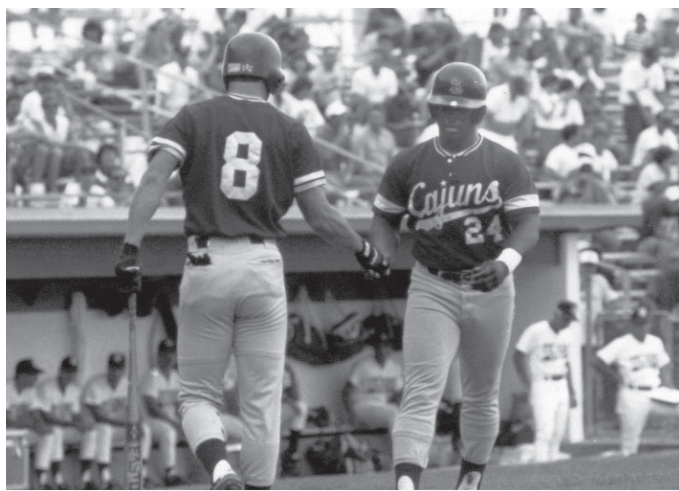

Ron Guidry made his major league debut in 1975 with the New York Yankees. His first full season came in 1977, when the Lafayette native finished the season with a 16-7 record and 2.82 ERA, while striking out 176 batters. Guidry is perhaps remembered most for his magical season of 1978. That year, "Gator", as he was known to fans and teammates, delivered one of the best pitching records in major league history. Guidry compiled a 25-3 record with a 1.74 earned run average.

He set a then-Yankee record with 248 strikeouts and also pitched nine shutouts. Guidry started all 35 games in which he appeared. That season, the New York Yankees won their 22nd world championship when they defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-2.

Guidry received many honors and awards for that season, most notably the Cy Young Award. He finished second in the American League MVP voting behind Boston Red Sox outfielder Jim Rice. Guidry was voted Sporting News Player of the Year, Sporting News Man of the Year, AP Male Athlete of the Year and was selected to the AP, UPI and Sporting News All-Star teams.

"Gator" would go on to enjoy two more 20-win seasons in 1983 (21) and 1985 (22). He would only surpass the 200 K mark one more time in his career (1979).

During his 14-year major league career, Guidry won five consecutive Gold Glove awards from 1982-86.

He led the American League in ERA in 1978 and 1979. On June 17, 1978, Guidry set the then-American League record for strikeouts with 18.

From 1977 to 1985, Guidry compiled nine-straight double-digit win seasons. In 1983, Guidry pitched a career-high 21 complete games.

On July 13, 1988, Ron Guidry announced his retirement from the Yankees and Major League Baseball.

Guidry finished his stellar career with a 170-91 overall record and 3.29 ERA and 1,778 strikeouts.

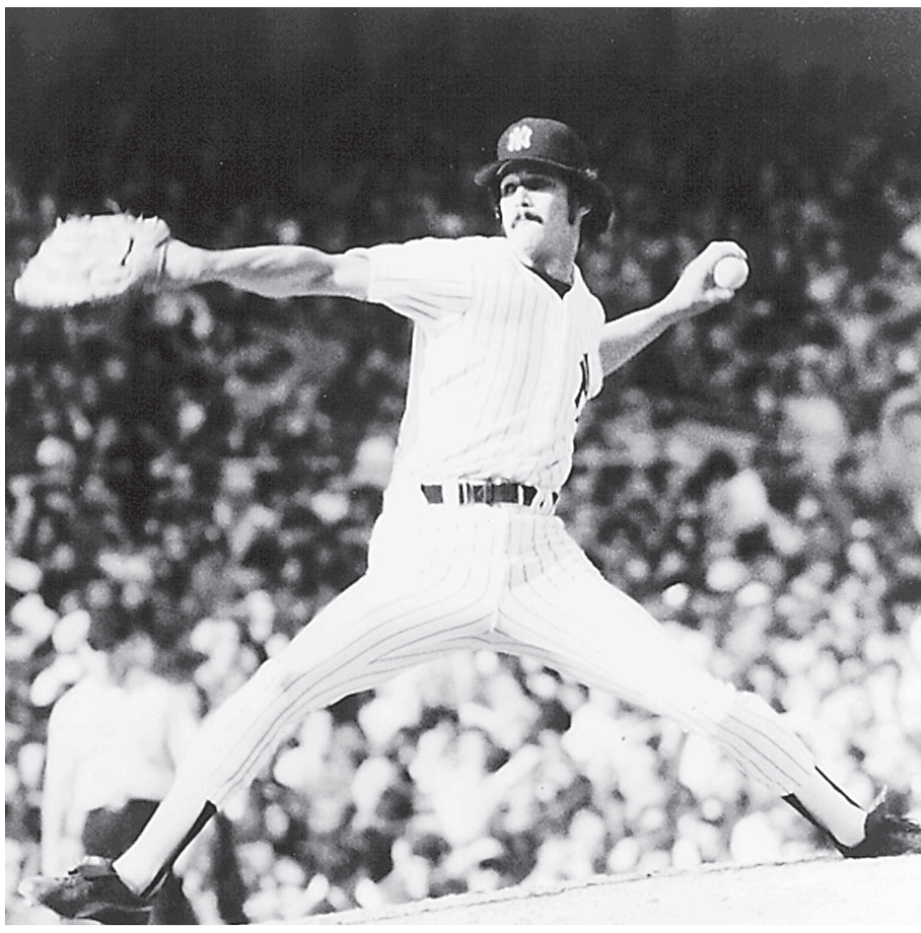
RON GUIDRY ON HISTORIC YANKEE STADIUM

"Twenty-seven years ago, I walked into the stadium for the first time and I remember looking at this field and seeing how beautiful this place was...I feel fortunate not only that I got to play pro ball, but I got to play it with the only team I ever wanted to play pro ball for."

RON GUIDRY DAY

On August 23, 2003, Guidry was honored at Yankee Stadium before the Yankees played the Baltimore Orioles. Guidry's uniform number was retired and was presented with a plaque in Monument Park, which includes some of the greatest players to ever don a Yankees uniform like Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Mickey Mantle and Joe DiMaggio.

He became the 16th player in team history--and the second pitcher--to have his number retired in the 101-year history of

the Yankees. Whitey Ford is the only other pitcher in team history to have his number retired. Former teammates Goose Gossage and Don Mattingly were among those in attendance to honor Guidry. Hall of Fame catcher Yogi Berra and Louisiana head coach Tony Robichaux were also in attendance for "Ron Guidry Day" in New York City.

COLLEGIATE CAREER

In 1969, Ron Guidry led then-Southwestern Louisiana to a fourth-place finish in the Gulf States Conference with a 12-12 conference record and a 14-16 overall mark. Guidry finished the season 5-1 en route to second team All-Gulf State Conference honors. Guidry finished his freshman campaign with a 1.57 ERA, allowing just 10 earned runs on 36 hits in 56.1 innings. Guidry struck out 50 batters.

In 1970, Guidry led the Cajuns to a runner-up finish in the Gulf States Conference. Then-USL, under head coach Bob

Banna, compiled a 26-15 overall record with a 15-9 mark in conference play. "The Ragin' Cajun", as he would later be known as with the New York Yankees, earned a 7-4 overall record with a 2.37 ERA and 87 strikeouts. Although Guidry's name is not dotted all over the record books, his 1969 freshman season has been noted as one of the best performances by a pitcher in Gulf States Conference history. Guidry finished his two-year college stint with a 12-5 record with a 2.03 ERA. He finished with 137 career strikeouts.

RON GUIDRY, THE PITCHING COACH

Prior to the 2006 season, Guidry joined the New York Yankees coaching staff as the Pitching Coach. In 2006, he led the Yankees pitching staff to a Major League-best 97-65 record in his debut season. Prior to joining the staff, Guidry served as a spring training instructor since 1990 with the Yankees organization.
