

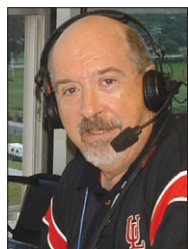

Voice of the Ragin' Cajuns

Play-by-play announcer **Jay Walker** has served as the "Voice of the Ragin' Cajuns" since 1991. He handles the play-by-play duties for Cajuns football, men's basketball and baseball.

A broadcasting veteran since 1971, the native New Englander has spent his entire broadcasting career in southwest Louisiana. His sports background includes years of broadcasting high school sports, while also serving as the television play-by-play voice of Ragin' Cajuns athletics from 1984-91 before joining the radio network.

In addition to his duties with the network, Walker also hosts the Mark Hudspeth, Bob Marlin and Tony Robichaux Coach's Shows on MyKLAF-TV (Cox/LUS 13, DirecTV 62). He is also the host of the popular sports talk show, "Bird's Eye View," which airs Monday-Friday from 3-6 p.m. on ESPN 1420 AM.



STEVE PELOQUIN

Color Analyst

Sports Radio ESPN 1420 Programming Director **Steve Peloquin** has served as color analyst for the Ragin' Cajuns Radio Network since 2002.

Peloquin is the football color analyst and is the primary play-by-play voice for women's basketball and softball.

Under his guidance, coverage of women's basketball and softball has increased to nearly 100 live events

since 2007-08, with plans for even further expansion.

A broadcasting veteran since 1991, Peloquin hosts the always entertaining morning sports show, "Thinking Out Loud," which airs Monday-Friday from 7-9 a.m. on ESPN 1420 AM.

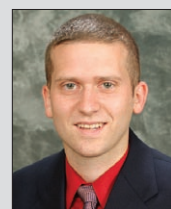

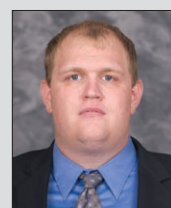

COVERING LOUISIANA

Mark Hudspeth Availability

■ Head coach **Mark Hudspeth** will be available for interviews on Monday during the Sun Belt Coaches Teleconference and at his weekly luncheon. He is also available from 8:15-11:15 a.m., Monday-Wednesday, for telephone and in-person interviews. Once a request is approved by the Sports Information Office, **Judy Becker** will coordinate an appointment.

Player Availability

■ **MEDIA MEMBERS SHOULD NEVER CONTACT A STUDENT-ATHLETE DIRECTLY AT ANY TIME.**

■ That contact rule begins the minute the S-A enrolls in school as a freshman until the time they run out of eligibility – off-season and summers included. Contact includes, but is not limited to, in-person interviews outside of an athletic event or practice, phone calls, text messages, email and any other form of online communication (ie. Facebook, MySpace, etc.).

■ Student-athletes have been instructed to immediately terminate any contact initiated by a member of the media.

■ Player interviews **MUST** be arranged through the SID office. During the season, select Cajuns players are available to the media twice a week, typically Tuesdays and Wednesdays. To arrange an interview, please call or email **Daryl Cetnar** at least 48 hours in advance. Post-practice interview requests for coaches & players must be made 24 hours in advance. Those interviews will be conducted in the Bob Fournet Recruiting Zone behind the Cox Communications Athletic Center. Players will not be available for game-day interviews until the post-game press conference. **Interviews will always be scheduled around a student-athlete's academic schedule.**

■ 2011 Football Student-Athlete Availability

Sunday – Practice Closed – No coach or player interviews
Monday – Players Day off (except those brought to Media Luncheon), coaches available by appointment

Tuesday – Practice Closed – Interviews after practice

Wednesday – Practice Closed – Interviews after practice

Thursday – Practice Closed – No player interviews

Friday – Walk-through closed – No interviews

Saturday – Post-Game only

(all availability subject to change at any time without prior notice)

Practices

■ **Practices are closed to the media, but may be open at any time upon announcement. Media should contact the SID office if they plan to attend an open practice and should be aware of the designated areas around the practice field from which to view practice.**

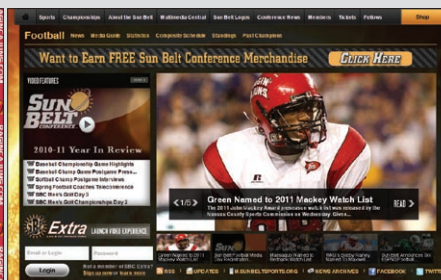
■ Video crews shooting footage during practice, though, are asked to limit their filming to the first 30 minutes.

Injury Information

■ The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) regulates the use and disclosure of certain information held by "covered entities". It establishes regulations for the use and disclosure of Protected Health Information (PHI). PHI is any information held by a covered entity which concerns health status and provision of health care that can be linked to an individual. This is interpreted rather broadly and includes any part of an individual's medical record.

■ **HIPAA Privacy Rule.** Under the HIPAA Privacy Rule, the University must reasonably limit uses and disclosures of medical information to the minimum necessary to accomplish their intended purpose. In order to supply the media with injury information related to student-athletes, the University shall be limited to discussing the athlete's name, along with a broad term for the injury and upcoming playing status.

■ Student-athletes that miss practice due to an injury will not be available to the media for post-practice interviews.

■ Student-athletes that are injured during a game will not be allowed to participate in post-game media interviews.

■ **Members of the media should never approach athletic trainers to discuss the injury of a student-athlete.** All covering news outlets, including live television and radio broadcasts, will be supplied with in-game injury information by the SID.

Game Notes

■ During the season, football game notes will be available on Mondays at Noon to media members and will also be available at www.ragincajuns.com.

■ In addition, a late Monday release will contain highlights from head coach Mark Hudspeth's Monday press luncheon. A mid-week practice report and other necessary game information will be released late Wednesday.

■ If media require additional notes, statistics or information not listed in the game notes package, please contact the SID office with your needs. Please allow time for the SID staff to research your questions.

Working Press Area

■ The entrance to the Cajun Field press box is through the press elevator, located at Gate B adjacent to the elevator tower on the west side of Cajun Field.

■ The press box opens approximately three hours prior to game time and meals will be served in the press box beginning approximately 90 minutes to kickoff.

■ Working media credentials are required for admittance to the press box and for meals.

■ The Level 1 area is reserved for media members as well as game staff and statistical personnel. Broadcast outlets, coaches booths and game management areas are located on Level 2. The camera deck is located below Level 1.

■ The press area, as well as the Cox Communications Media Room, is equipped with high-speed wireless internet. Media and photographers can access the network with the proper log-in information. Please contact the SID staff for help.

■ Electrical outlets and telephone lines are available on a first-come, first-served basis in the working press area and Media Room.

Press Box Media Services

■ Pre-game notes, programs, guides and statistics along with other information will be provided to all media members prior to kickoff. Play-by-play and stat sheets are provided at the end of each quarter. Live running stats are also available via monitors throughout press row and on the internet at www.ragincajuns.com during the game.

■ Internal public address provides updated information and notes throughout the game as well as play-by-play particulars.

■ Members of the UL SID staff will man the press box phone number, (337) 851-2255, which should be used for any questions or information needed during the game.

■ **Louisiana and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) jointly remind you that the Cajun Field press box is a working press facility and that cheering for either team will not be tolerated. Violators will be asked to leave by security personnel.**



CREDENTIAL & PARKING POLICIES AND GUIDELINES

Credentials, parking passes and working space for all media members are issued at the sole and exclusive discretion of the UL SID office.

Media must request credentials in writing through SID Daryl Cetnar at sportsinfo@louisiana.edu. The SID Office should receive all credential requests no later than 10 days prior to the game. All season credential requests must be made at least two weeks prior to the season.

ANY ATTEMPT TO REPLICATE A PARKING PASS OR CREDENTIAL FOR THE INTENT OF DISTRIBUTION WILL RESULT IN A PERMANENT LOSS OF PRIVILEGES.

Requests from individuals not employed by a legitimate media outlet WILL NOT be considered.

Working Credentials

■ With the exception of those covering the Ragin' Cajuns daily, all passes are issued on a game-by-game basis with consideration of available working space.

■ Louisiana reserves the right to deny media credentials to any individual.

■ Requests will be honored from sports editors of daily newspapers and sports directors of TV and radio stations.

■ Time permitting, credentials will be mailed. However, in the event that credentials cannot be mailed, they can be picked up at Media Will Call which is located at Gate B at the base of the Cajun Field elevator tower. During the week, credentials may be picked up in the SID Office located in Room 140 of the Cox Communications Athletic Center.

■ Credentials are non-transferable and are subject to immediate revocation at any time, if transferred.

■ Only websites that are affiliated with a national or regional news media organization (CNN/SI, ESPN, etc.) or an opposing institution will be considered for credentials.

■ Web sites that sponsor "message boards" or "chat rooms" where people are allowed to post anonymously are ineligible for credentials and access to media functions.

■ If a news-gathering medium has an on-line site that sponsors these anonymous forums, they may continue to request credentials under its traditional medium (newspaper, magazine, radio or television), but will not be granted additional passes or access for on-line staff. **ALL passes can be revoked if the traditional medium fails to monitor its anonymous forum for malicious defamation against the University and its' coaches, student-athletes and administrators.**

■ All media members are asked to enter the stadium through the media gate located adjacent to Gate B at the base of the Cajun Field elevator tower.

Media Parking

■ Media parking at Cajun Field is available on a limited basis in a designated lot. Requests for parking passes should be made well in advance to the SID office. It should not be assumed that parking passes will be provided to all media. Passes must be displayed in the front windshield at all times (you will not be allowed in the parking area without a parking pass).

media GUIDELINES

Postgame

■ Requested Cajuns players and head coach Mark Hudspeth are available in the interview room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling-off period.

■ **The Louisiana locker room is CLOSED to the media at all times. Media outlets may request players to be brought to the interview room for post-game interviews.**

■ The Cajun Field elevator will be held for working press midway through the fourth quarter and will promptly leave with 5:00 left on the clock to take media members to the post-game interview area. Members of the UL Sports Information staff will escort media to the interview room (located in the auxiliary building behind the Cox Communications Athletic Center) and will be available to handle requests.

Postgame Media Services

■ Game books and Louisiana player and coach quotes will be distributed in the media work room. The media work room is located in the Cox Communications Athletic Center, Room 140. **All media members are asked to complete their game stories in the media work room.**

■ UL will provide complimentary fax/email service for media by request only. Should you need information faxed or emailed, please contact a member of the Louisiana SID staff.

Credential Priority

Credentials are issued based on the following priorities and guidelines:

1. Personnel involved in a live radio or TV broadcast.
2. Daily newspapers and media outlets regularly covering Louisiana and the current opponent. Wire services, regional and national publications are also afforded this opportunity.
3. Non-originating radio and television personnel producing reports on the game. Only local radio and TV stations with a full-time sports director conducting a regular sports show will receive consideration for credentials.
4. Officially recognized UL or opponent student publications or electronic media outlets.
5. Non-daily newspapers or publications covering the game.

NOTE: Spouses, dates, non-workers and anyone under 18 years of age are not permitted in the working press area.

CREDENTIALS MUST BE VISIBLE AT ALL TIMES.

Visiting SID/AD

■ Three seats, two electrical outlets, and a phone line, (337) 262-5826, are reserved for visiting SIDs. Contact Daryl Cetnar in advance to make specific arrangements. Please provide 35 copies of your game notes, or email a final pdf no later than Thursday of game week.

■ Passes for the travel party will be sent by Daryl Cetnar to the visiting SID, unless otherwise instructed. Please make your entire credential request at least 10 days prior to the game. Teams will be allotted 50 sideline passes and 10 additional passes for the coaches booth and video staff. No more than 10 all-access passes will be granted.

■ Each visiting athletics director is given a private box. The box is located on the second floor of the press box. Enter door marked "Visiting AD Box". Ten tickets will be sent to the attention of the visiting SID, along with all travel party passes.

Photo Requests

■ Requests for still and action photos of current student-athletes must be made in writing to **Daryl Cetnar**. Still and action photos of former student-athletes are available on a very limited basis. Media outlets should make requests – via e-mail – well in advance of any deadline. Headshots of current student-athletes can be accessed via www.ragincajuns.com. Contact the SID staff for instructions on how to download the 3.0"x3.5", 300dpi, images.

Sidelines and Live Photography

■ **The sidelines at Cajun Field are an extension of the press box and are limited to working personnel only.** NCAA guidelines are enforced, with photographers not allowed to shoot within the confines of the 25-yard-lines on either side of the field. Credentials are required on the sidelines. **Photographers and videographers that shoot in the team area will be removed from the sidelines and may have their credential privileges revoked.**

■ Photographers wishing to work the sideline areas should notify the SID staff well in advance of the game.

■ It is against NCAA and University rules to sell any image taken at a practice or during a game – especially, but not limited to, current student-athletes.

■ **The photo deck is located below the Cajun Field press box and is accessible through the working press area.** All team film and television taping should be done from this area. Credentials are required for this area.

■ Visiting team videographers should contact Darren Walker, Video Coordinator, at (337) 482-6872 for specific information.

Television

■ Television rights are retained by the Louisiana Athletics Department and any station desiring to originate either live or delayed broadcasts must contact Scott Farmer, Interim Director of Athletics at (337) 482-5393.

Visiting Radio

■ Radio rights for Louisiana football are owned by KPDL Radio. Stations wishing to receive their broadcast or needing more information about the network may contact Jay Walker at (337) 233-6000 or by e-mail at jay@espn1420.com.

■ Only the "official" radio outlet of the visiting team is permitted to originate a live broadcast without written permission of the UL Athletics Department. **Two standard analog telephone lines are provided by KPDL in the visiting radio booth.** The University provides a dry-pair line from the visiting radio booth to the visiting locker room. Please contact the SID office at least two weeks in advance if you will be using the dry-pair connection.

■ If the official visiting radio station needs additional analog telephone lines or ISDN lines, please contact AT&T directly to place your order. The physical address of Cajun Field is 2351 West Congress St., Lafayette, LA 70506. Allow 4-6 weeks for installation.

■ Radio booths are located on the second level of the press box. The visiting radio booth is located adjacent to the public address booth. Look for signs marked "PA / Visiting Radio".

■ Other visiting stations desiring to originate broadcasts must get approval from UL SID **Daryl Cetnar** before any arrangements will be made or credentials are issued.

■ Each Monday during the regular season, **Mark Hudspeth** will hold a weekly media luncheon beginning at noon in Room 140 of the Cox Communications Athletic Center. **This event is open ONLY to credentialed members of the media.**

■ Lunch will be served between 12-12:15 p.m. with Hudspeth's opening comments scheduled to follow shortly after. Schedule permitting, student-athletes may be available to address the media during this time (if there are not class conflicts). Media are asked to arrive early.

WELCOME TO CAJUN FIELD

41st season • Capacity: 31,000 • 114 Wins • Sun Belt Attendance Leader 2004 & 2008

Cajun Field has served as the home of Ragin' Cajuns football since September 1971. UL holds an all-time mark of 114-98-2 at Cajun Field.

Attendance numbers have spiked in recent years, as four of the 11 highest attended games ever have occurred in the last four seasons (including a new stadium record of 41,357 vs. Southern in 2009).

Those attendance figures also rank No. 1, No. 2 and No. 8 on the largest home stadium attendance in Sun Belt Conference history.

Cajun Field hosted the 1,000th Cajuns game in school history on Nov. 1, 2008 before a Sun Belt Conference game-record crowd of 29,031. In fact, eight of the 21 best conference game crowds have occurred at Cajun Field.

UL was the SBC Attendance Champion in 2004 and 2008.

With a 4-1 record at home in '08 and one of the nation's top offenses, the Cajuns posted their best home average since 1996 with 21,468 per game.

From 2003-04, Louisiana won six straight home games, the fourth longest streak at Cajun Field.

Louisiana has enjoyed plenty of memorable moments since the venue opened in 1971.

The greatest of those moments came during the 1996 season when the Ragin' Cajuns opened their 26th season in the facility with the biggest upset in school history, a 29-22 victory over No. 25 Texas A&M in front of a then-record crowd of 38,783 fans.

That mark surpassed the previous record crowd of 36,133 that saw the Cajuns face Alabama on Oct. 6, 1990.

"The Swamp" has been the site of much success with four consecutive 4-1 records from 1993-96. The school record for wins at Cajun Field in a season is seven, set during the 1976 season, one of two undefeated seasons at "The Swamp."

Cajun Field boasts 2,577 chairback seats and bleacher seating to the capacity of another 28,423, giving "The Swamp" a seating capacity of 31,000. General admission seating on the hills in both end zones give fans the opportunity to overflow the stadium.

Cajun Field was built in time for the 1971 football season. The characteristics which helped create the name and traditions have been there since the initial construction.

For the first 17 years, Louisiana's football stadium was simply known as Cajun Field. In the summer of 1988, then-Strength & Conditioning Coach Mickey

Faulkinberry suggested referring to Cajun Field as "The Swamp."

The name stuck for various reasons. To start, the field surface is set two feet below sea level in a natural bowl. In addition to providing a picturesque surrounding, the sunken facility allows most fans to walk down to their stadium seats. The Cajuns and their opponents must enter Cajun Field through a long tunnel from the Cox Communications Athletic Center.

"The Swamp" nickname also fits in with the geographic makeup of the area, with its many surrounding bayous and wetlands, as well as the close proximity to the Gulf of Mexico, which lies just 30 miles south.

In fact, a popular gathering place for Louisiana students and a regular stop for visitors is the small swamp located in the heart of UL's main campus, which sits adjacent to the Student Union. Ironically, the on-campus swamp, officially named Cypress Lake, lays over the original football field that existed during the early 1900's, adding to the distinct nickname.

The National Wetlands Center, a nationally renown research facility that UL hosts and administers, is located less than a half-mile from Cajun Field.

In the summer of 2008, Cajun Field removed its long-standing natural grass and entered a new era with a synthetic playing surface.

LEON MONCLA INDOOR FACILITY



- A new era of Ragin' Cajuns facilities was born in August 2007 when the multi-purpose Leon Moncla Indoor Practice Facility was unveiled.

- The 88,791-square foot facility was built by architect Gene Sellers for approximately \$4.5 million.

- The facility houses a full 120-yard football field turf surface purchased from the New Orleans Saints that was used during a NFL season, New Orleans Bowl and Sugar Bowl National Championship game.

- The basketball portion includes a full court with six goals, locker room, video room, players lounge and meeting room. The basketball court was taken from the Cajundome and was replaced by a court used in the NCAA Women's Basketball National Championship game.

- In the fall of 2009, the NBA's New Orleans Hornets held preseason workouts at the facility.

- Drop-down batting cages hang above the west end zone and are utilized by the baseball, softball and golf teams. Baseball and softball use the turf to take infield practice. Soccer, tennis and track also use the facility periodically.

The Cajuns
Offense

The Ragin' Cajuns were a dominate run team from 2005-08, but quickly transitioned to a spread offense in 2009 and 2010.

New offensive coordinator **Jay Johnson** was known for his powerful rushing offense at Southern Miss and for his wide open passing attack at Central Michigan. In determining his offense with the Cajuns, Johnson is leaving his options open.

Look for the team to – at least early in the season – have a split attack of run and pass. With several newcomers expected to make an impact, the offense might be a constantly evolving force.

Once Johnson gets a feel for the personnel, the offense should mirror the team's strengths. Ideally, Johnson wants his offense to remain as balanced as possible, thriving off of play-action.

In the end, the offense will likely blend with what the starting quarterback does best.

Among the open position battles, the starting quarterback will not be named until the fall. Nearly all of the offensive positions have openings, including running back, offensive guard and wide receiver.

Due to injuries, the Cajuns started three different signal callers in 2010 and each found success. A competitive spring battle left **Chris Masson** and **Blaine Gautier** in the hunt to earn the starting nod this fall.

UL managed to rush for over 100 yards in just four games last season, winning only once. Four very highly touted prep running backs enter the fold in 2011. There is potential for the newcomers to see playing time, but it will be determined on a case-by-case basis.

The Cajuns wide receivers were widely inconsistent in 2010, allowing the team's All-American tight end **Ladarius Green** and freshman running back **Aaron Spikes** to finish first and second in receptions, yards and touchdowns, respectively.

The offensive line lost three senior starters for the second straight season. The line is very young, with only five players having FBS playing time, but inexperienced talent can be found.



CHRIS MASSON

Quarterback

• The Cajuns could implement a two-quarterback system, allowing the team to feature both players. **Chris Masson** is the more polished passer, while **Blaine Gautier** is a dynamic runner.

• **Brad McGuire** fell behind in the spring due to minor injuries, but remains a viable back-up. Last season, he replaced an injured Masson at Ohio after one series and threw for 384 yards and two scores.

• Masson started nine games last season. He has good pocket presence, experience, shows excellent senior leadership and does a good job managing the game.

• Masson led the team with 1,842 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2010. He threw for over 300 yards and two scores three times (at NT, vs. OSU, at ULM) and the Cajuns were 2-1 in those games.

• Gautier makes plays with his arm and his legs. He became the sixth quarterback in school history to pass for 100 yards and rush for 100 yards in the same game. In only his second career start, Gautier threw for 186 yards and ran for 112 against FIU.

• Under center for six games in 2010, Gautier collected 550 yards passing, while running for 280 yards at quarterback/wildcat in eight games.

• Gautier's lack of game experience is his biggest pitfall. In 89 passing attempts, he was sacked 12 times and threw six interceptions.

• McGuire missed the first four games of 2010 with an injury, but returned as a back-up quarterback and short-yardage runner.

• McGuire is a multi-faceted player, much bigger and stronger than the other quarterbacks. He is a leader with intangible qualities the team rallies around. His ability to move around within the offense means the coaching staff is likely to find room for him on the field.

• Despite having the "weakest" arm of the three quarterbacks, McGuire's average yards per pass in 2010 was much better than the other two starting quarterbacks. (McGuire 16.0/pass, long 48; Masson 12.5/pass, long 82; Gautier 12.2/pass, long 63)

• Junior **Brady Thomas** is a solid player that knows the position. He adds good depth to the team.

• Sophomore **Terrence Broadway** has promise, but despite a pending appeal, will likely sit out 2011 after transferring from Houston.



AARON SPIKES

Running Back

• The Cajuns running game was erratic in 2010, despite attempting more than 30 rushes in seven different games.

• The ground game took a major hit when junior college transfer **Kevis Streater** (17 carries for 144 yards through three games) was severely injured in the fourth game of the year. Streater's knee injury ended his career.

• Oddly, the team hit the win column in two of its' worst rushing games (25-41 at North Texas and 24-48 at La.-Monroe).

• Of the 14 rushing touchdowns, 11 were scored by the Cajuns quarterbacks.

• True freshman **Aaron Spikes** produced 339 yards on 103 carries (3.3ypc) to lead the team. He was more effective catching the ball out of the back field with 23 receptions for 398 yards and six scores.

• Spikes needs to continue to improve as a runner, as the team will look for backs to run inside the tackles.

• Fellow true frosh **Robert Walker** was third on the team with 162 yards on 50 carries (3.2 ypc).

• Walker had a fantastic spring, showing the ability to run in the trenches.

• Junior **Yobes Walker** is a strong, physical runner who has experience and will provide good depth. He played in 10 games as a reserve fullback and on special teams last season.

• The Cajuns will use the fullback position primary as blockers in jumbo and protection packages.

• Some of the high profile newcomers include **Alonzo Harris**, rated as the nation's No. 2 fullback prospect by Scout.com, and **Qyendarius Griffin**, Mississippi's Mr. Football who ran for 2,670 yards and 37 touchdowns his senior season.

• The Cajuns running back signees were ranked in the Top 40 nationally by Rivals.com

LADARIUS GREEN

Receivers & Tight Ends

• **Ladarius Green** was named a 2010 All-American by CBSSports.com and Phil Steele. The John Mackey Award Semifinalist enters the 2011 season seventh in school history in career receiving yards (1,595), tied for fourth all-time in career receiving touchdowns (14) and needs 26 catches to reach fifth all-time in career receptions (currently has 98).

• Last season, Green led all tight ends nationally in receiving yardage (794), receiving yards-per-game (79.4), receiving yards-per-catch (18.0), games with 80 yards or more receiving (7) and receiving touchdowns (7).

• Green made a catch of 20 yards or longer in all but one game he played, despite being double-teamed on over 90% of his routes. He caught a touchdown pass in seven of 10 games played and posted 100-yard receiving games in four of the final five contests.

• Look for the new Cajuns coaching staff to use Green in various offensive formations. They will look to get him the ball and exploit mismatches the six-foot-six tight end creates with his speed and athleticism.

• Green topped all players in the Sun Belt Conference with four 100-yard receiving games and in yards-per-reception (18.0).

• Junior **Javone Lawson** was having a nice season until a season-ending injury cut his campaign short at the midpoint. He posted 271 yards on 19 catches, with his total receptions increasing each game.

• True freshmen **Darryl Surgent** and **James Butler** showed progress, combining for 21 receptions and 355 yards. Lawson, Surgent and Butler will be the Cajuns main vertical weapons.

• Senior **Andrew Joseph** is a solid slot receiver. He had 22 receptions for 238 yards and one TD in 2010.

• Senior **Pierre Hill** will also see time in the slot (17-204), but he missed spring practice and fell behind.

• Incoming JUCO **Harry Peoples** will add depth. Peoples, along with three prep signees, provide an influx of talent that will compete to play.

• Sophomore tight ends **Jacob Maxwell** and **Ian Thompson** each had solid springs. The offense has faith in all the tight ends to block when required and make plays offensively when called upon to do so.



LEONARDO BATES

Offensive Line

• The offensive line lost three senior starters for the second straight season, leaving little experience behind.

• Depth is thin, meaning the team will be forced to count on a few of the three redshirt freshmen and six signees.

• The Cajuns will be forced to start at least one rookie offensive lineman, but the group won't hold back the coaches decisions on scheme and tempo. The goal is to get the unit to play as a whole and come together, playing in sync with the offense.

• Senior **Kyle Plouhar** (6-foot-6, 300 pounds) has the most game experience of the group, but has taken only 633 snaps in his 29 career games played.

• Junior **Jaron Odom** (6-foot-7, 330 pounds) hasn't missed a game in two seasons and has over 1,000 snaps under his belt. Like Plouhar, he has played both guard and tackle.

• Junior **Leonardo Bates** (6-foot-5, 296 pounds) has played in 19 games, seeing 813 snaps. He lost weight heading into the spring and the results were evident. Bates impressed the coaching staff tremendously.

• Sophomore **Andre Huval** (6-foot-1, 305 pounds) moves to center after appearing in nine games as a true freshman. Huval showed flashes in 2010 and will have to continue to mature at an accelerated rate.

• Redshirt **Daniel Quave** (6-foot-3, 324 pounds) emerged during the spring as an up-and-coming lineman.

• Incoming JUCO **Brandon Bender** (6-foot-3, 285 pounds) has the best shot of all newcomers to help the team, as he matured to an All-MACJC South Division selection and MACJC All-Star game participant in 2010.

• The coaching staff likes the future of the five incoming prep linemen (**Octravian Anderson**, **Jaylen Hunter**, **Fred Moore**, **Mykhael Quave**, **Greg Siener**), but only fall camp will reveal if any are ready for playing time in 2011.

The Cajuns
Defense

The Ragin' Cajuns have used a base 4-3 defense for years, but began to periodically show 3-4 looks beginning in 2009 when current Tennessee Titans defensive end Hall Davis would occasionally play upright at the snap.

New defensive coordinator **Greg Stewart** prefers to give multiple pre-snap looks.

Stewart's hybrid 4-3 base can give a 3-4, 4-3, 5-2 or an eight-man front look without changing personnel. The goal is to confuse the quarterback pre-snap without sacrificing the ability to stop the run or get to the quarterback.

With pressure packed defensive schemes, the defensive line and linebackers are expected to work in rotation. Luckily the Cajuns have the depth up front to roll players without a drop in talent.

The team used spring practice to prepare for the new schemes. With little experience in the system, Stewart believes his players will develop a better feel for his defense with more practice reps.

The Cajuns have terrific depth along the defensive front, leaning on more than three deep during spring drills.

Eight linebackers should see playing time in a rotation. The Cajuns will move around their strong-side linebacker quite a bit, putting **Devon Lewis-Buchanan**, **Brandon Nash** and **Andrew Hebert** in position to make plays in the backfield.

Since the Cajuns will put more bodies in the box than the offense can block, the secondary will be tested. Three experienced seniors in **Dwight Bentley**, **Lionel Stokes** and **Melvin White** have proven to be difference makers on the field.



DERRECK DEAN

Defensive Line

• The tackles blend a mix of experienced players with fresh faces.

• Senior **Derreck Dean** is the elder statesman of the group, playing in 36 career games. He is backed-up by less experienced sophomore **Brandon McCray** (10 games played) and junior **Ben Duhon** (three games played).

• The other tackle position will be up for grabs.

• LSU transfer **Cordian Hagans** didn't do enough in spring drills to lock down a starting position. Redshirt freshman **Darrell Green** showed promise and earned a spot on the depth chart.

• Senior **Tyrell Gaddies** has 24 games of experience, but missed all of spring practice due to injury. He must quickly learn the new system to be added to the mix.

• The defensive ends are led by senior **Bernard Smith**.

• Smith had a terrific spring and impressed his coaches, showing he can be a dominant player. Smith was inconsistent in 2010, but still tallied six tackles-for-loss and two sacks.

• **Emeka Onyenekwu** took a big stride from his redshirt season to last year's sophomore campaign. He led the team with 3.5 sacks and was second with 6.5 tackles-for-loss.

• **Aaron Thibodaux** is young and still developing, but can run well and should contribute.

• The other defensive end position features the strong and athletic duo of senior **Chris Tucker** and sophomore **Justin Anderson**. The pair combined for 45 tackles, six tackles-for-loss and three sacks in 2010.



DEVON LEWIS-BUCHANAN

Linebacker

• At strong-side linebacker, **Devon Lewis-Buchanan** is the top returner and a veteran of 33 career games. He recorded 63 tackles, six tackles-for-loss, 2.5 sacks, six pass break-ups and an interception last season.

• **Brandon Nash** and **Andrew Hebert** got their feet wet as redshirt freshmen, combining for 42 tackles, 2.5 TFLs, two forced fumbles and one sack.

• The other two linebacker positions are interchangeable, meaning five players occupy two spots. **Lance Kelley** and **Richard Brooks** are the leading candidates to start.

• Brooks was snake bit by injuries his first two seasons, but saw time in 10 games in 2010. He's been a good player when healthy, totaling 68 tackles in 20 career games.

• Kelley came to the Cajuns as a wide receiver, but has played strong safety the past two seasons. He finished seventh on the team in total tackles in 2010, one year after ranking 10th.

• Durability will be a concern for both seniors, as Brooks and Kelley have each missed 16 games over the last three years.

• Transfer **Jelani Smith** and true freshmen **Jacob Molbert** and **Brandon "Trae" Johnson** will compete for playing time.

• Smith sat out all of 2010 after transferring from Arkansas. He did gain some experience in 2008 and 2009, playing in nine games with the Razorbacks, making two starts.

• Both Molbert and Johnson enrolled for Spring 2010 semester classes and enjoyed the benefits of spring drills to get acclimated to the Cajuns schemes.

Block Party

Strong special teams have been the staple for the Cajuns in recent years. UL has blocked 44 kicks – ranking fourth in the nation – since 2002. The Cajuns have accumulated seven touchdowns, one safety and one defensive extra point on the blocks. In 2003, the Cajuns returned two blocked field goals for touchdowns to set a NCAA single-season record. Charles Tillman was the last player to block two kicks in the same game (Arkansas in 2002). The Cajuns have blocked 18 field goals, 13 punts and 13 extra points since 2002. Seven times, the squad blocked two kicks in the same game.

LIONEL STOKES

Secondary

• Coach Hudspeth was most impressed with the secondary over any other position during spring drills.

• The starting corner spots are locked down by Dwight "Bill" Bentley and Melvin "MJ" White.

• Bentley has started 32 games over the past three seasons and boasts 161 tackles, 14 pass break-ups, eight tackles-for-loss and four interceptions in his career.

• White hasn't missed a game in two seasons and has a pair of starts to his credit. Although not as experienced as Bentley, White has logged significant minutes and is a tough match-up for opposing receivers at 6-foot-3, 190 pounds.

• The team lacks suitable back-ups due to inexperienced depth. Redshirt freshman Trevence Patt was the only other scholarship corner to participate in spring drills.

• Lionel Stokes emerged as the leader of the defense with a stellar spring. He will set the coverage on the field from his safety position.

• Stokes was third on the team in 2010 with 59 tackles and led the squad with three interceptions. He was outstanding during spring drills, giving the coaching staff a great deal of confidence in him.

• The other safety position is wide open. Sophomore Cooper Gerami battled with redshirt freshman Earnest Gardner all spring, but neither could distance themselves.

• The unsettled picture will be further muddled with the return of senior Le'Marcus Gibson. Gibson was highly effective, posting 23 tackles and two interceptions. He missed the final five games of 2010 and all of the spring recovering from a knee injury.



BRETT BAER

Special Teams

• The Cajuns lost their all-conference punter Spencer Ortego, a four-year starter, to graduation.

• Kicker Brett Baer, who assumed the placekicking role midway through the 2010 season, was the lone kicker/punter on the roster in the spring. Baer was 7-for-7 on field goal attempts last year. He struggled in the spring, but it should come as no surprise since he's never been consistent in practice.

• Incoming freshman Carlos Alvarez will compete in fall camp for both punting and kicking duties.

• Matt Rosenbalm earned his first letter as a deep snapper last season and will again handle the duties. Back-up John Broussard is a redshirt freshman.

• No player on the team has ever returned a punt at the Division I FBS level. Incoming JUCO Harry Peoples is expected to be the primary punt returner. Sophomore wide receiver Darryl Surgent was the leading punt returner in the spring.

• Five players rotated in the spring on kickoff return, including Surgent, Javone Lawson, Robert Walker, Dwight Bentley and Aaron Spikes.

• Lawson returned seven kickoffs for 135 yards as a freshman in 2009 and three for 61 yards last season. Surgent led the team in 2010 with 31 kickoff returns for 629 yards and one touchdown. Spikes had eight returns for just 91 yards, while Walker had four returns for just 61 yards.

• The team concentrated heavily on blocking schemes and personnel in the spring, with more work to be done in the fall.

• Quarterbacks Chris Masson and Brad McGuire will serve as the team's holders.

WHO WE ARE

The story behind our name and nickname.

Our Name

We were founded in 1898 by a legislative act authorized by Senator Robert Martin (the main administrative building was later named in his honor). Although several towns competed to be the site of the new school, Lafayette was chosen by virtue of a donation of 25 acres of land by the Girard family. The community also offered \$8,000 and a ten-year property tax to supplement state appropriations. In 1900, the first campus buildings were constructed and Southwestern Louisiana Industrial Institute opened its doors on Sept. 18, 1901. Dr. Edwin L. Stephens was named the first president, as SLII started with 100 students and eight faculty members. In 1921, the school became known as Southwestern Louisiana Institute when it was designated as one of the state's institutions of higher learning. Upon achieving university status in 1960, our name was changed to the University of Southwestern Louisiana. That name lasted until 1999 and was replaced by the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. Athletically, using the reference "at Lafayette" is not necessary in the same examples as North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Texas at Austin and Tennessee at Knoxville.

Our Nickname and Mascot

In 1921, then-SLI adopted the nickname and mascot Bulldogs. The first use was a drawing voted on by the student body. Famous architect Hays Town did the first rendition of the bulldog while he was a student.

The first use of a live mascot dates back to 1937. During the 1937-38 school year, the first dog was actually a pit bull. The following season, the school used an English bulldog as its mascot and continued to use English bulldogs every season with one exception. In 1943-44, the school mascot was a stray dog named Willoughby.

For the next several years, all bulldogs were named "Gee" after the popular coach George Mitchell. Mitchell served as boxing coach from 1940-1942 and head football coach from 1947-49, compiling an 18-8-1 record on the gridiron.

Beginning in 1963, just a few seasons after the name change to USL, university football teams were dubbed the "Raging Cajuns" by then-Sports Information Director Bob Henderson and head football coach Russ Faulkinberry. In addition, the team switched from gold helmets to white helmets with an Acadian flag. At the time, more than 90 percent of Faulkinberry's team was composed of Louisiana high school players, many with French-speaking Acadian backgrounds.

The "Raging Cajuns" nickname stuck, and in 1967 the second "g" was dropped to form the word Ragin'. In the early 1970's other sports teams began to adopt the Ragin' Cajuns nickname. The University made a full switch to Ragin' Cajuns during the 1974-75 school year as part of "Operation Turnaround".

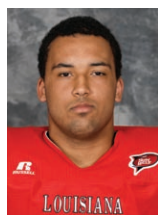
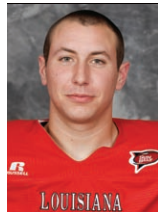
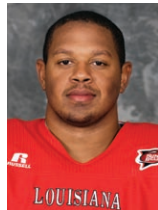
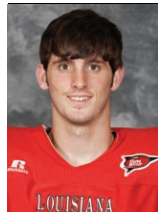
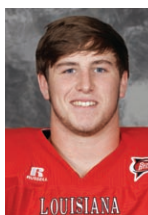
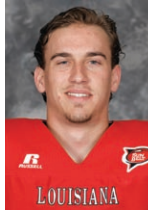
Even though the nickname had changed, USL continued to use a bulldog as its mascot until the early 1970's. In 1982, USL debuted its new mascot, named Mr. Cajun, a shotgun-carrying hunter riding a giant crawfish. The design was chosen from a student-submitted contest. Mr. Cajun was quickly replaced by Cajun Man, but in 1984, the Fabulous Cajun Chicken was introduced and became a wildly popular unofficial mascot who entertained fans for more than a decade. The bulldog mascot, however, was reintroduced as a live English bulldog named Ragin' Cajun from 1990-1996. Red, another English bulldog, debuted in the fall of 1996, but served as the mascot for only one season. Cayenne, the Cajun Pepper, became the new mascot in 2001 and still serves as the mascot today.

The Fabulous Cajun Chicken made a brief return in 2007-08, appearing at a baseball game on Apr. 17, 2007, Football Fan Day on Aug. 12, 2007 and a men's basketball game on Jan. 19, 2008.

**Mark Hudspeth**

The University of Louisiana introduced **Mark Hudspeth**, the former Mississippi State passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach and North Alabama head coach, as the school's 25th head coach on December 13, 2010.

In addition to finding success as a head coach, the 42-year old Louisville, Miss., native has learned from some of the most successful football coaches in the country. A 19-year coaching veteran, Hudspeth brings with him a national championship, four conference championships, eight post-season appearances and four Coach of the Year awards.

In nine seasons as a head coach, Hudspeth totaled a 91-22 record.

"We were very fortunate to have many extremely qualified candidates express an interest in becoming the next Ragin' Cajuns head football coach," former Athletics Director David Walker stated at the press conference announcing Hudspeth's hiring. "Each one possessed qualities that we felt would benefit our program. Many are outstanding coaches and outstanding recruiters. All expressed a commitment to the academic success of their student-athletes and most were very involved in their community. Each candidate is an exceptional individual."

"Coach Hudspeth possesses all of these qualities and we are extremely excited that he will lead our football program."

Hudspeth spent the 2009 and 2010 season at Mississippi State, where he helped turn around a football program that had only one winning season in a nine-year span. The Bulldogs finished 2010 with an 8-4 record, earning a Gator Bowl trip vs. Michigan.

Prior to his appointment at Mississippi State, Hudspeth spent seven seasons as the head coach at North Alabama, leading the Lions to a 66-21 record. UNA won a pair of Gulf South Conference championships, made five NCAA playoff appearances and boasted 15 All-Americans.

Attendance increased 122% under Hudspeth and the team grade-point-average was raised a full point to 2.76 - the highest team GPA in school history. UNA was ranked for 54 weeks and ranked in the Top 10 for 38 consecutive weeks. Hudspeth's offense averaged over 35 points per game.

In 2008, Hudspeth led UNA to its fourth-consecutive 10-win season, posting a 12-2 record and a berth in the NCAA Division II semifinals. The Lions ranked sixth nationally, scoring 41.3

points per game. In 2007, Hudspeth led the Lions to a 10-2 record and reached the national quarterfinals.

In 2006, the Lions had an 11-1 record, won a GSC title and advanced to the quarterfinals of the Division II playoffs. Hudspeth was selected as the Gulf South Conference Coach of the Year for the second time by his peers and was also the NCAA Division II Region 2 Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

In 2005, Hudspeth led a UNA squad that

went 11-3 and reached the semifinals of the Division II playoffs for the second time in three years.

The Lions went 4-7 in Hudspeth's first season (2002), but posted a 13-1 record and advanced to the NCAA Division II semifinals in 2003. For his efforts, Hudspeth was named GSC Coach of the Year in just his second season as a collegiate head coach and was the Division II Region 2 Coach of the Year by the AFCA. He coached Will Hall, who won the Harlon Hill Trophy (DII Heisman Trophy).

Prior to his stint at North Alabama, Hudspeth served as the offensive coordinator at the United States Naval Academy in 2001.

Hudspeth was the offensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coach at Delta State University from 1999-2000. He helped lead the Statesmen to a NCAA Division II National Championship in 2000 and his offense broke 21 school records, 12 Gulf South Conference records and six NCAA Division II records that year.

Hudspeth served as the head coach at Winston Academy in Louisville, Miss., in 1996 and 1997. He posted a 25-1 record over two seasons including an undefeated regular season mark.

From 1994-95, Hudspeth served as the wide receivers/tight ends coach and then the running backs coach at Nicholls State.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Central Arkansas from 1992-93, winning the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference in 1992.

As a student-athlete, Hudspeth was a four-year letterman at Delta State from 1987-91. He was the starting safety in 1990 and led the team in interceptions. In 1991, he was the starting quarterback. Hudspeth earned his Bachelor of Arts in Health & Education from Delta State in 1992 and his Master's of Science in Secondary School Administration from Central Arkansas in 1993.

**Timothy Edwards**

A college teammate of Mark Hudspeth at Delta State, **Timothy Edwards** was reunited with Hudspeth in March 2011 when he was named to the Cajuns' coaching staff.

Edwards came to Louisiana after spending the previous three seasons as co-defensive coordinator, recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach at Florida A&M.

At FAMU, Edwards was part of a program that went 25-9 during his three seasons with the Rattlers. He oversaw a strong defensive line that included coaching All-SEC defensive lineman Cameron Houston in 2008.

Prior to his stint with the Rattlers, Edwards served a five-year tenure at Hampton University. He coached the defensive line and linebackers, in addition to serving as the recruiting coordinator.

Edwards helped bring in a wealth of talent that resulted in one of the best four-year runs in school history. Hampton won three consecutive Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference championships (2004-06), made three NCAA playoff appearances (2004-06) and captured back-to-back Black College National Championships in 2004 and 2005.

Edwards began his career as a defensive line and linebackers coach for Kentucky State in 1998 and eventually had stops with the AF2's Carolina Rhinos and Pearl River Community College before landing at Hampton in 2003. He was a New Orleans Saints Minority Fellowship Intern during the team's 2007 training camp.

His days on the sideline have helped to develop the professional careers of several former players including: Justin Durant (Jacksonville Jaguars), Kendall Langford (Miami Dolphins), Marcus Dixon (Dallas Cowboys, New York Jets) Cletidus Hunt (Green Bay Packers, NFL), Kitwana Jones (Saskatchewan Rough Riders, CFL), Dewayne Woods (Georgia Force, AFL) and Chris Avery (Grand Rapids Rampage AFL). Edwards coached four All-Americans in Hunt at Kentucky State and Jones, Durant and Langford at Hampton.

Edwards is a 1991 graduate of Delta State, earning a bachelor's degree in aviation management.

He was a two-time First Team All-Gulf South Conference selection as a defensive lineman and played alongside Hudspeth, who was a four-year letterman at DSU from 1987-91. Edwards was inducted into the Delta State Sports Hall of Fame in the fall of 2008.

A 12th round pick in the 1991 NFL Draft, Edwards spent the 1992 season on the New England Patriots roster. He later signed a free agent contract in 1995 with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League, with whom he spent three years.

A native of Philadelphia, Miss., Edwards is a member of the NFL Retired Players' Association, the CFL Retired Players' Association and the American Football Coaches Association.

Jay Johnson

Jay Johnson started at Louisiana in 2011 as the Cajuns' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

He spent the 2010 year as Central Michigan's quarterbacks coach, helping sophomore Ryan Radcliff post one of the top passing seasons in school history. Radcliff completed 282-of-466 passes for 3,358 yards and 17 touchdowns. He threw the second most passes in school history, completed the third most and threw for the third most yards. His 17 touchdown passes tied for the seventh most in school history. Entering the bowl season, Radcliff ranked ninth nationally in both total passing yards and yards per game (279.8) and 11th in completions (23.5 per game).

Johnson came to CMU from Louisville, where he spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons. Prior to Louisville, Johnson was at Southern Miss for five seasons, including three as offensive coordinator (2005-07). The Golden Eagles made five consecutive bowl game appearances during Johnson's time on staff.

In 2007, Southern Miss set a school record with 5,066 yards of total offense. The Golden Eagles ranked Top 25 nationally in rushing in 2006 and 2007, gaining more than 2,000 yards on the ground each season. Southern Miss averaged 27.8 ppg in 2007 and 29.6 ppg in 2005, the program's two highest scoring seasons in a decade.

Johnson worked directly with the Southern Miss quarterbacks from 2005-07, running backs in 2004 and tight ends in 2003. During that time, Johnson worked alongside current-Cajuns offensive line coach Mitch Rodrigue, who held the same position at USM.

Johnson also coached the school's third 1,000-yard running back in school history when Damion Fletcher ran for more than 1,300 yards in consecutive seasons.

Under Johnson's tutelage in 2005, Dustin Almond set the school's single-season record for passing completions (216), passing attempts (392), and total offense (2,762). His 23 touchdown passes were the second most in school history.

Johnson coached at Kansas from 1997-2001, working with the quarterbacks (1997-2000) and running backs (2001).

He also served as offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator at both Augsburg (1994) and Truman State (1995-96). He directed Truman State's offense to an average of over 30 points and 400 yards per game in 1995 and 1996.

Johnson began his coaching career at Columbia-Hickman High School in Columbia, Mo., in 1993, serving as quarterbacks, receivers and defensive backs coach. He was a graduate assistant at Missouri in 1994 prior to taking on the offensive coordinator role at Augsburg.

A 1992 graduate of Northern Iowa, Johnson was a three-time All-Gateway Conference selection as a quarterback and two-year team captain. He led UNI to a combined record of 31-8 during his career, three conference championships and three appearances in the I-AA playoffs. He finished his career with almost 500 completions and threw for more than 8,000 yards and 58 touchdowns. The 1992 team finished the season 12-2 overall and ranked No. 3 nationally.

Johnson earned President's Academic Excellence honors in the Gateway Conference and was a Dean's List scholar at Northern Iowa where he compiled a 3.47 GPA. He held a perfect 4.0 grade point average while completing his master's degree at Missouri. That earned him a Superior Graduate Achievement Award from the Department of Health and Exercise Science.

He also taught several courses while at Truman State and Missouri.

**Marquase Lovings**

Marquase Lovings began his tenure as a member of the Ragin' Cajuns' coaching staff in 2011, serving as running backs coach.

Prior to joining the Cajuns, Lovings spent four seasons at Mississippi State. During his first two seasons he worked as the defensive quality control coach, while the last two seasons he served as the defensive graduate assistant working on the staff with Cajuns head coach Mark Hudspeth.

While at MSU, Lovings worked under four different defensive coordinators, Ellis Johnson in 2007 (later became the defensive coordinator at South Carolina), Charlie Harbison in 2008 (later became the defensive coordinator at Clemson), Carl Torbush in 2009 (later became the defensive coordinator at Kansas) and Manny Diaz in 2010 (later became the defensive coordinator at Texas).

Lovings' main focus with the Bulldogs defense was with the defensive linemen. He worked under defensive line coaches David Turner and Chris Wilson (Wilson became the MSU defensive coordinator in 2011).

The Bulldogs had several standout defensive linemen during Lovings' four years, including Titus Brown. Brown signed an NFL free agent contract and has been on the Cleveland Browns active roster since 2008. Lovings helped three defensive linemen earn All-SEC honors, with Brown (2007 Second Team), Fletcher Cox (2009 Freshman Team) and Pernell McPhee (2010 First Team) taking those honors.

Lovings also has experience coaching in a two bowl games, including MSU's rout of Michigan, 52-14, in the 2011 Gator Bowl. It was the worst loss Michigan had ever suffered in any bowl game in its history.

Lovings also helped MSU win the 2007 Liberty Bowl, as the Bulldogs defense held UCF to just three points. MSU kept UCF star running back Kevin Smith from breaking the NCAA single-season rushing record. The junior finished 61 yards shy of Barry Sanders' mark of 2,628 yards set for Oklahoma State in 1988.

"I was trying to find the holes, but they were playing faster than us," Smith stated after the Liberty Bowl.

In 2007, Lovings' defensive line faced three of the top four rushers in the country during the season, holding each of them well under their season average. MSU limited Arkansas' Darren McFadden to 88 yards (143.8 season avg.), Tulane's Matt Forte to 47 yards (177.3 season avg.) and UCF's Smith to 119 yards (188.3 season avg.).

A graduate and former tight end at Howard University, Lovings also has high school coaching on his resume with stints at Dunbar High in Washington, D.C. and at his alma mater P.K. Younge High in Gainesville, Fla.

He earned his M.S. in Sports Administration from Mississippi State in 2008 and pursued a doctorate in education at MSU.

Jorge Munoz

Jorge Munoz returned to the Cajuns coaching staff in 2011 under new head coach Mark Hudspeth and serves as the wide receivers coach.

In 2008, Munoz was added to the Cajuns staff as the Quarterbacks Coach and Passing Game Coordinator. One of his main responsibilities was play calling. In his first season calling plays, UL ranked seventh in the nation in rushing, 13th in total offense and 24th in scoring.

That same season, Munoz helped quarterback Michael Desormeaux record the second most yards of total offense in school history. Desormeaux was named the 2008 Sun Belt Offensive Player of the Year. Running back Tyrell Fenroy had his best season as well, rushing for 1,375 yards and 19 touchdowns. Fenroy was a Doak Walker Award Semifinalist, named the 2008 Sun Belt Player of the Year and became the school, SBC and State of Louisiana all-time leading rusher.

The Cajuns "Play Station" attack of 2008 shattered the school record for total offense with 5,390 yards, besting the 1995 record of 4,780 yards. As a team, the Cajuns scored 54 touchdowns, the most in school history. The quick strike offense ranked 10th in the nation with 22 touchdown drives under two minutes and 10th nationally in touchdown drives of five plays or less. UL led the nation with 11 offensive touchdowns of 50 yards or more. In addition, 18 different players made at least one reception, the fourth most in the country.

The offense continued to thrive with Munoz calling the plays in 2009, as 16 different players scored a touchdown. Quarterback Chris Masson threw for 2,406 yards passing – the fourth best single-season total in school history. He came within two completions of tying the school single-season mark as well. As a unit, the Cajuns offense ranked 16th in the NCAA in red zone efficiency.

In 2010, the Cajuns ranked 34th nationally in passing offense, despite starting three different QB's due to injury. All three QB's threw for 250-plus yards in a game and Masson surpassed 4,000 career passing yards – the sixth player at UL to do so. In addition, tight end Ladarius Green led the nation in receiving yards and touchdowns by a tight end and earned All-America honors from CBSSports.com.

Prior to UL, Munoz spent three seasons at Eastern Illinois. He was promoted to Offensive Coordinator in March 2007 after being named co-Offensive Coordinator in the summer of 2006.

Under his direction, EIU ran a more diverse offense in 2006, with four players earning first team All-Ohio Valley honors, including OVC co-Offensive Player of the Year Vincent Webb and third team All-American Micah Rucker. The Panthers ranked 18th in the nation in rushing and either first or second in the OVC in rushing, total offense and pass efficiency.

EIU's offense in 2007 had a 1,000-yard rusher for the fourth straight season with five Panthers earning first team All-OVC honors and three players earning honorable mention All-America honors. EIU ranked 33rd nationally in scoring and 36th in rushing yards.

Munoz spent two seasons as the wide receivers coach at Charleston Southern (2003-04). During the 2004 season, his wide receivers ranked first, second and fourth in the Big South Conference. The Buccaneers passing offense ranked first in the Big South and 17th in the NCAA.

At Anderson University, his 2002 offense ranked fifth in DIII passing and set six school records, while the 2001 offense ranked sixth in passing and set 22 school records. His quarterback was the MVP of the HCAC both seasons.

A 1998 graduate of Bethany College, Munoz was a two-time All-American quarterback. He played one year in the Arena Football League with the Albany (NY) Firebirds. Munoz was a multi-sport standout at San Diego Hilltop HS.

**Tim Rebowe**

Tim Rebowe has strong ties to the state of Louisiana, having coached his entire career in the Pelican State. Rebowe returns to coaching the Ragin' Cajuns' safeties in 2011 under new head coach Mark Hudspeth.

In previous years on the Cajuns' staff, Rebowe coached the Cajuns safeties from 2004-07 and tutored the linebackers from 2008-10.

The Cajuns' linebackers had stellar seasons for three years under Rebowe, with a member of the linebacking corps leading the team in tackles each season.

Rebowe guided linebackers Antwyne Zanders and Grant Fleming, who ranked first and second on the team in total tackles in 2009, respectively. Both players were named All-Sun Belt Conference. For Zanders, it was his third All-SBC recognition, while Fleming earned All-SBC for the second time.

The Cajuns' pass defense had a stellar first year under Rebowe in 2004, finishing with a No. 11 national ranking in passing yards allowed.

Both of Rebowe's starting safeties advanced to the NFL. Strong safety C.C. Brown (101 tackles) was drafted by the Houston Texans in the 2005 NFL Draft and free safety Antwain Spann, who signed as a free agent with the New York Giants, played in NFL Europe and several seasons with the New England Patriots.

In 2005, the Cajuns' pass defense was 23rd nationally, allowing only 190 yards per game despite opponents facing an uphill climb in eight games. The Cajuns trailed after three quarters just twice in 2005.

Rebowe also coached a pair of exemplary student-athletes in Lamar Morgan, a NFF Hampshire Honor Society member and a Draddy Award semifinalist, and Johnny Felders, currently coaching at Istrouma High School.

Rebowe came to UL after three seasons as cornerbacks coach at Sun Belt rival La.-Monroe.

Prior to his stint with the Warhawks, Rebowe spent six years at Nicholls State where he served as defensive backs coach (1995-2000), special teams' coordinator (1995-98), recruiting coordinator (1998-2000) and wide receivers coach (2000). In 1996, the Colonels pass efficiency defense ranked seventh nationally in I-AA.

A native of Norco, La., Rebowe began his coaching career in 1987 at his alma mater, Destrehan High School.

His ties to the Cajuns began in 1994 when former Destrehan High star Damon Mason transferred to Louisiana from Jones County JC. Mason would go on to have one of the best careers by a defensive back in Cajuns history.

Rebowe earned his bachelor of science in physical education from Louisiana State University in 1987.

He is married to the former Kim Robichaux and they have a daughter, Samantha, and a son, Tyler.

Mitch Rodrigue

Mitch Rodrigue joined Louisiana in 2011 as the Cajuns' running game coordinator and offensive line coach.

Rodrigue, a 20-year collegiate coaching veteran, came to UL after three years on the South Alabama coaching staff working with offensive tackles and tight ends.

In USA's inaugural season, two of Rodrigue's tight ends played a vital role in helping the offense average 439 yards and nearly 46 points per contest.

Prior to his arrival at South Alabama, Rodrigue spent the previous nine seasons at Southern Miss, where he coached the offensive line (2003-07), tight ends (2000-02) and running backs (1999). He was named one of the Top 10 recruiters from a non-BCS conference by Rivals.com in 2006.

From 2003-07, Rodrigue worked directly with current Cajuns offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Jay Johnson.

In 2006, Rodrigue's offensive line allowed just 10 sacks, ranking 18th nationally. The Golden Eagles rushed for an average of 169.9 yards a game, which ranked first in Conference USA and 25th nationally. The Golden Eagles set a school-record with 4,635 yards of total offense, including over 2,000 yards rushing for the first time since 1987, and the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2002. The offensive line also collected its first two All-Americans since the 1950s, with the naming of George Batiste and Travis Cooley to different squads.

In 2005, Rodrigue guided the offensive line to another strong season, as the offense finished with 4,288 yards of total offense, the sixth-best performance in school history. The offensive line, led by all-Conference USA performers Batiste and Cooley, only allowed nine sacks, ranking 12th in the nation, and did not allow a sack in six different games.

In 2004, the offensive line, led by Jeremy Parquet (second-team All-Conference USA) and Chris Clark (C-USA All-Freshman Team), surrendered only seven sacks. Parquet was selected in the seventh round by the Kansas City Chiefs in the 2005 NFL Draft.

During his first season leading the USM offensive line (2003), Rodrigue helped the Golden Eagles win their fourth Conference USA title and earn an invitation to the Liberty Bowl despite working with a unit that had lost three starters to the NFL. Rodrigue saw three players - Parquet (first-team), Jim Hicks (second-team) and Chris White (third-team) - garner all-league honors.

Rodrigue coached the running backs in 1999 and the tight ends from 2000-02. He also assisted with the offensive line during his initial stint at Southern Miss, serving as the program's graduate assistant in 1989 and 1990.

During his 11 seasons at USM, the Golden Eagles made nine bowl trips - participating in the GMAC Bowl (2000, '06), New Orleans Bowl (2004, '05), AXA Liberty Bowl (1999, 2003), PapaJohns.com Bowl (2007), Houston Bowl (2002) and All-American Bowl (1990).

Rodrigue also coached several seasons at his alma mater, Nicholls State (1993-98), serving as tight ends and offensive line coach as well as offensive coordinator. His stay coincided with Ragin' Cajuns head coach Mark Hudspeth, who coached the wide receivers, tight ends and running backs from 1994-95.

While at NSU, Rodrigue helped the Colonels lead the Southland Conference in passing. In addition to his time as the Colonels' offensive coordinator, he served at various times as recruiting coordinator and, after the resignation of Rick Rhoades in 1995, interim head coach. As offensive line coach, Rodrigue's linemen blocked for the school's first 1,000-yard rusher in 1996. Rodrigue was also a student assistant coach in 1987-88 while he finished his undergraduate degree.

Prior to Nicholls State, Rodrigue coached two seasons at Pearl River (Miss.) Community College (1991-92) where he served as offensive line coach, as well as strength and conditioning coach.

Rodrigue earned a bachelor's degree in health & physical education from Nicholls State in 1988 and a master's degree in educational administration and supervision from Southern Miss in 1990. He was an offensive lineman for one season at Copiah-Lincoln (Miss.) Community College before transferring to Nicholls State, where he helped the Colonels win the 1984 Gulf Star Conference title and reach the second round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 1986.

A native of Thibodaux, La., Rodrigue was born on Jan. 2, 1965. He and his wife, Deidi, have three children, Maci, Madden and Mallori.

**David Saunders**

David Saunders joined the Cajuns in 2011 as the cornerbacks coach and assistant recruiting coordinator.

Saunders came to Louisiana from Mississippi, where he had three stints at Ole Miss, the last beginning in April 2010 as Administrative Operations Coordinator.

He served as the Rebels' linebackers coach in 2006. That post came after a three-year term (2003-05) as head football coach at Millsaps College.

Prior to being named head coach at Millsaps, Saunders spent four years at Ole Miss, including the first two as Assistant to the Athletics Director for Recruiting and the final two as Coordinator of High School and Community College Relations.

During his first employment at Ole Miss, which began in December 1998, Saunders established an acclaimed recruiting program and was lauded as one of the top nine recruiters in the nation by Tom Lemming of ESPN.com.

Saunders joined the Ole Miss athletics staff after working with Tennessee during their National Championship season of 1998, where he assisted with on-campus recruiting.

Prior to accepting the position with the Vols, Saunders served two years as defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Arkansas State (1996-97). He spent the 1995 season coaching safeties and special teams at Baylor.

During the 1993 and 1994 seasons, Saunders was the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Nicholls State. While at JSU, Saunders coached defensive back Eric Davis, who earned All-Pro honors in the NFL and played for the 1995 Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 49ers. Saunders also coached receiver Keith McKeller, who played in three Super Bowls with the Buffalo Bills, and defensive back Darrel Malone, who played with the Kansas City Chiefs and Miami Dolphins.

Before entering the collegiate coaching ranks, Saunders was an assistant football coach at Andalusia (Ala.) High School from 1982-83.

**Greg Stewart**

Greg Stewart was added to the Ragin' Cajuns' coaching staff in 2011 as the team's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Stewart's coaching tenure spans 20-plus years, including 18 years of experience at Jacksonville State, with 11 seasons orchestrating the Gamecocks' defense.

Stewart turned the Gamecocks into the most dominant defense in the Ohio Valley Conference. In 2010, JSU turned in one of the biggest upsets in college football, winning at Ole Miss. The Gamecocks narrowly missed upsets the previous year, hanging with No. 15 Georgia Tech and holding Florida State in check in a 19-9 defeat.

In 2009, his defense led the conference in seven major defensive categories, including scoring defense (17.1), yards per game allowed (304.8), passing yards per game allowed (154.9), pass efficiency defense (104.0), opponent first downs per game (15.5), opponent third down conversion percentage (31.2) and turnovers gained (27).

JSU led the OVC in scoring defense for four straight years from 2006-09, allowing just 17.5 points per game in 2006, 23.4ppg in 2007 and 21.7ppg in 2008.

In 2007, the Gamecocks led the league in total defense (354.3 yards per game), rushing defense (145.5 yards per game) and opponent first downs per game (17.8).

In 2006, the Gamecocks allowed just 17.5 points per game, 114.8 rushing yards and only 270.2 yards of total yards, which were all tops in the conference.

The 2005 squad allowed only 20.4 points per game.

After joining the OVC in 2003, the Gamecocks placed 24 defensive players under Stewart on the All-OVC teams, including 12 since 2008.

Stewart began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at JSU in 1989 and was elevated to full-time in 1991.

He helped lead the Gamecocks to the 1992 NCAA Division II National Championship. He coached the Gamecocks outside linebackers from 1989-94, running backs in 1995, defensive backs in 1996 and defensive line in 1997.

Stewart spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach at Delta State from 1998-99. He was on the coaching staff at DSU with current Cajuns head coach Mark Hudspeth in 1999 when Hudspeth was the offensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coach.

He returned to Jacksonville State in 2000 as the defensive coordinator/inside linebackers coach.

Stewart was a four-year starter at nose guard for current Sun Belt foe Troy from 1984-87. He helped guide the Trojans to two NCAA Division II National Championships and earned a degree in sociology in 1988.

The Decatur, Ala., native was born on June 6, 1965. He is married to the former Angela Peacock and they have four children, Jessie Kate, Hannah, Kinsey and Holly.

Reed Stringer joined the Cajuns in 2011 to serve as assistant head coach, tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator.

Prior to working at Louisiana, Stringer served as the offensive player development coach at Clemson in 2010.

Before his time with the Tigers, Stringer spent seven seasons at Mississippi State in a variety of roles. He began as a graduate assistant with the Bulldogs offense, primarily working with the offensive line from 2003-2004. Stringer was then named the tight ends and special teams coach from 2005-08.

He took over as the coordinator of recruiting operations at Mississippi State for head coach Dan Mullen in 2009. Stringer coached alongside current Cajuns head coach Mark Hudspeth during the 2009 season.

Considered to be a relentless and effective recruiter, Rivals.com rated Stringer among the "SEC's Top 10 Recruiters" for 2009. He was personally responsible for recruiting 13 student-athletes for the highly revered 2009 MSU class and his recruiting efforts were a major reason for MSU's quick turnaround under Mullen.

Before being named to his recruiting coordinator position, Stringer spent four seasons as the tight ends coach, adding special teams coordinator duties in his final two seasons.

As tight ends coach, Stringer responded in 2005 by helping Eric Butler become the school's all-time touchdown receptions leader among tight ends with seven scoring catches. In 2007, his tight end corps combined for the most receptions by the position at MSU since 1990. Under Stringer's guidance, Butler and teammate Dezmond Sherrod worked their ways to professional football careers.

His impact was also felt immediately with the special teams. After his average dipped by nearly four yards per punt between his freshman and sophomore seasons, punter Blake McAdams returned to the 40-yard threshold in 2007. Placekicker Adam Carlson, who made just 8-of-16 field goals in his first two seasons at MSU, improved to make 9-of-12 opportunities.

Even more improvement was made by the Bulldogs coverage units, which reduced both kickoff return and punt return yardage against. In 2008, return specialist Derek Pegues finished his career as the SEC's all-time kickoff return yardage leader.

Stringer's coaching career began as a graduate assistant/tight ends coach at Delta State in 2002.

He was a four-year letterman on Delta State's offensive line, helping DSU claim the 2000 NCAA Division II national championship with then-DSU offensive coordinator Mark Hudspeth. Stringer concluded his career with 35 consecutive starting assignments at left tackle. In addition to that '00 national title, he was also instrumental in helping Delta State win the 1998 and 2000 Gulf South Conference championships.

Stringer was a two-time academic All-Gulf South Conference player and an Academic All-American and was named to the GSC Academic Honor Roll three times.

He earned a bachelor's degree in business management from Delta State in 2001 and completed a master's in business administration from Delta State in 2003.

Former Cajuns standout **Troy Wingerter** entered into a new role with the Ragin' Cajuns football program in 2011, becoming the Director of Football Operations for head coach Mark Hudspeth.

Wingerter started his career with the University of Louisiana Athletic Department in 1997. He was the tight ends coach as a graduate assistant from 1997-99 under former coaches Nelson Stokley and Jerry Baldwin.

Wingerter coached the defensive ends in 2001 under Baldwin and served in the role of Cajuns' tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator from 2002-10 for Rickey Bustle. Wingerter was named Bustle's assistant head coach for the 2009 and 2010 season.

Green was a mid-season addition to the 2009 Mackey Award Watch List – one of three underclassmen on the 22-man midseason list. He also earned All-Sun Belt Honors.

In 2010, Green was one of just eight semifinalists for the prestigious Mackey Award. He was a First Team All-Sun Belt selection, a First Team All-Louisiana pick and garnered Second Team All-American honors by CBSports.com and Fourth Team All-American accolades by Phil Steele.

Entering his senior season, Green was named to the 2011 Mackey Award Watch List and Bilitneko Award Watch List. Green was also tabbed as a Top 5 draft eligible tight end by espn.com insider Mel Kiper, Jr. and was named a preseason All-American by BleacherReport.com (1st Team), Athlon (2nd Team), GoDaddy.com (3rd Team), Phil Steele (4th Team) and CDSdraft.com (Honorable Mention).

Wingerter tutored a pair of red zone targets in Kevin Belton and Aubrey in 2007 and 2008, respectively. Both players had six receptions, but each caught three for touchdowns. Wingerter coached Josh Joerg during his All-Sun Belt season in 2002.

After earning his bachelor's degree in 1993, Wingerter embarked on a four-year career in corporate business working in Lafayette, New Orleans, Colorado and Montana.

Upon his return to UL, Wingerter earned a master's degree in education.

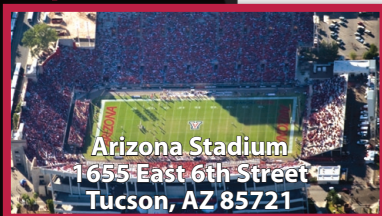

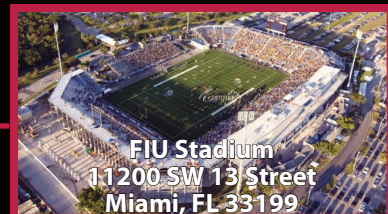
